Mittu turned to the little fish and asked "Do you like your gift at least, little fish?"






the sun up. So my feet might feel good in a pair of sandals." He beamed and tried the sandals on. The sandals were a perfect fit and the rooster felt very good.

Jantar Mantar-Delhi.



The Jantar Mantar is located in the modern city of New Delhi. It consists of 13 architectural astronomy instruments. The site is one of the five built by Maharaja Jai Singh II of Jaipur, from 1724 onwards, as he was given the task by the Mughal Emperor Muhammed Shah of revising the calendar and astronomical tables. There is a plaque fixed in 1910 mistakenly dating the construction of the complex to the year 1710 on one of the structures in the Jantar Mantar observatory in New Delhi. Later research, though, suggests 1724 as the

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actual year of construction.

The primary purpose of the observatory was to compile astronomical tables, and to predict the time and movement of the sun, moon and planets. Some of these purposes nowadays would be classified as astronomy.

Completed in 1724, the Delhi Jantar Mantar had decayed considerably by 1867.

Between 1727 and 1734 Jai Singh II built five similar observatories in West-Central India, all named Jantar Mantar. They are located at Jaipur, Ujjain, Mathura and Varanasi. While the purpose of the Jantar Mantars is astronomy and astrology (Jyotish), they are also major tourist attractions and significant monuments in the history of astronomy.
